#### PROCEEDINGS

CHAIRMAN KAVANAUGH: At this time, on our agenda, we are going to have the public hearing on our annual Fee Schedule.

The public hearing is being held to give members of the public and Commission stakeholders an opportunity to comment on staff proposals regarding the 2023-2024 Arizona Physicians' and Pharmaceutical Fee Schedule and to make additional recommendations for changes to the Fee Schedule.

The Staff Proposal has been posted on the Commission's website for the last month.

And so Charles Carpenter, the Manager of the Medical Resource Office, will provide a brief overview of the Staff Proposal.

So, Charles, I'll hand it over to you.

MR. CARPENTER: Thank you, Chairman.

I'm not sure if it's so brief today. We've got quite a few updates that we're proposing.

So good afternoon Commissioners, Chairman,

Director Ashley, colleagues, and guests. Thank you for the opportunity to present the Staff Proposal for the 2023-2024 Physicians' and Pharmaceutical Fee Schedule.

So I'd like to begin by thanking the many stakeholders who have provided input that was used to improve and update the Fee Schedule this year. I want to recognize and thank those who attended our stakeholder meeting two weeks ago and also those who attended a similar meeting last year.

I also want to thank all of the stakeholders who attended our virtual meetings as we developed the Fee Schedule Proposal for this year.

Finally, I want to thank the Arizona Dental Association for their participation, their input and all their support in developing the Dental Fee Schedule for this year's proposal -- proposed Fee Schedule update.

So, first, staff proposes to include the updated service codes, relative value units or RVUs, and reimbursement values as presented in the tables accompanying the published proposal.

This year, staff proposes to use values from FAIR Health to establish the RVUs assigned to "gap" codes. Previously, we have used values from Optum to assign "gap" codes -- RVUs to "gap" codes. We analyzed

the methodology that's utilized by FAIR Health in establishing their RVUs and felt comfortable in that we could understand their methodology, and we did replace -- or we are using their methodology or their values for the RVUs for "gap" codes this year.

We are going to continue to use the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid services or CMS's, surgical global periods, and we will also assign RVUs to consultation services and delineate codes that are unique to Arizona.

We also propose to update the RBRVS conversion factor used in this year's -- or in the 2023-2024 Fee Schedule by increasing the conversion factor for Surgery services to \$72 and the conversion factor for Pathology, Medicine, Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation, and Evaluation and Management Services to \$68.

Second, staff proposes to adopt the service codes and reimbursement values as presented in the Healthcare Common Procedure Coding System, or H-C-P-C-S, HCPCS, table accompanying the published proposal.

The reimbursement values are based on the reimbursement values published by the CMS in the April 2023 Medicare Durable Medical Equipment, Prosthetics,

Orthotics, and Supplies for -- and Supplies Fee Schedule. Staff proposes to maintain separate values for rural and nonrural areas and to utilize the methodology established by CMS to designate rural and nonrural areas in Arizona.

HCPCS codes that did not have a value assigned by CMS were assigned a reimbursement value based on data from FAIR Health. The values were then multiplied by a conversion factor of 1.4, resulting in the reimbursement values listed in the table.

Third, staff proposes to adopt the Current Dental Terminology, or CDT®, codes and reimbursement values based on mean billed charges by Arizona dental professionals that constitute the Dental Fee Schedule.

Staff is finalizing contracts that license the Commission to distribute the full dental fee schedule to all who request a copy.

At this time, we can distribute, by request, a sample that includes the 34 most frequently billed codes and the assigned reimbursement values to those codes.

Staff worked closely with the Arizona Dental Association to develop this Dental Fee Schedule. The intent of this Dental Fee Schedule is to incentivize dental professionals to accept and provide services to

injured workers who need their expertise.

Staff has received numerous calls and emails from injured workers, nurse case managers, health care providers, and even adjusters where they are looking for dentists or a list of dentists who will accept and treat or provide services to injured workers.

So our collaboration with the Arizona Dental Association in developing this Fee Schedule is intended to incentivize dental professionals to participate and provide services to injured workers.

Fourth, staff proposes to continue the designation of Medi-Span® as the source to determine Average Wholesale Price (AWP).

Fifth, staff proposes to adopt the deletions and additions to the 2023 edition of the American Medical Association's Current Procedural Terminology publication, also known as the CPT®

Sixth, staff proposes revisions in each section of the Fee Schedule Guidelines by removing references that were already named in the Introduction Section and updating language regarding the Arizona specific codes to improve clarity. Staff also proposes to add the Dental, HCPCS, and Home Healthcare Guidelines as new sections of the Fee Schedule.

Seventh, staff proposes to amend the

Introduction Section of the Fee Schedule by adding language that defines dental practitioners and additional references to dental services and providers when appropriate. Staff also proposes to remove the reference to the 1995 and 1997 Documentation Guidelines and replace the documentation standard with the American Medical Association's Evaluation and Management Code and Guideline Changes and the Guidelines for Evaluation and Management Services in the current CPT® publication.

Staff proposes to remove the reference to Optum 360, The Essential RBRVS and add language that incorporates by reference FAIR Health data to assign RVUs to "gap" codes.

Additionally, staff proposes to amend Section B by adding the updated documentation standards in Subsection (B)(9) and adding a new Subsection, (B)(12) that references the Dental Fee Schedule for information on billing and reimbursing dental services.

Staff proposes to update the language in Subsection J(4) to clarify the appropriate manner to bill and reimburse supplies and materials given the adoption of the HCPCS codes. The last proposed update to the Introduction Section is in Section K and involves the addition of acronyms ADA for the American

Dental Association and CDT for the Current Dental Terminology.

Eighth, staff proposes to add language to Section C of the Anesthesia Guidelines that clarify billing procedures for healthcare providers.

Ninth, staff proposes to add modifier "59" to the Surgery Guidelines and additional language to modifier "AS" that clarifies appropriate reimbursement when the modifier is billed.

Tenth, staff proposes to delete HCPCS codes U0001 and U0002 from the Pathology and Laboratory Guidelines. These codes were developed in response to the COVID-19 Public Health Emergency and are no longer in use.

Eleventh, staff proposes to add Section F to the Medicine Guidelines to clarify the codes that are to be used for Moderate Sedation based upon the provider who performs the service.

Twelfth, staff proposes to add language to the Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation Guidelines that clarifies and emphasizes the documentation expectations for healthcare providers who bill for these services. This language was added based on reimbursement issues brought to our attention through -- by payers and providers as well.

Staff also proposes to update the language in Section D to reference the amended instructions in the Introduction Section on billing and reimbursing materials and supplies.

Thirteenth, staff proposes to add the descriptions for the Arizona Specific Codes to the Special Services Guidelines and also include documentation expectations when codes AZ003 and AZ004 are billed by healthcare providers.

Staff also proposes to delete Arizona

Specific Code AZ044. This code is no longer necessary since there are now currently CPT® codes that should be used when services are provided outside of regular business hours.

Fourteenth, staff proposes to update the Evaluation and Management Guidelines to correspond with the updates to the Evaluation and Management Guidelines in the 2023 CPT® publication.

And, finally, staff proposes to update the Special Services Code Table to reallocate the CPT® codes that were previously included in this section to the Medicine Code Table. This update does align with the format of the current CPT® publication.

And the Medical Resource Office appreciates your time considering this proposal. I am happy to

take any questions from the Commission.

On behalf as past president of the Arizona Self-Insurers Association, we do support the Staff Proposal on the Fee Schedule changes, but I would also like to bring up another issue that I have a concern about on behalf of Arizona Counties Insurance Pool, who I work with, that possibly we could work for the stakeholder process this year and maybe consider something for next year for the Fee Schedule, if it comes to that.

The issues involving paying hospital provider bills for injured workers. I spend about 40 percent of my time trying to call providers to get a bill so that we can pay them.

For example, I had a sheriff deputy who was shot in the lower torso in July of 2022. It was a traumatic injury, and, thankfully, he will make a full recovery; but I have spent countless hours trying to obtain his bill. He's been reported to collections four times.

I'm now friends with the collections agency because I called them so many times, but they can only request the hospital to send a bill, and we're still dealing with a bill from July of 2022.

And, unfortunately, for those of us who can't

direct medical care, we have no control of bargaining power over some of the hospitals that are providers.

I've had calls from injured workers who are in the middle of a mortgage and trying to get a loan and they get put on hold because something shows up on their collection.

I'd love to pay these bills. I'm sure the hospital would be happy to receive our money, but there seems to be a huge disconnect between this process, and I think a lot of it has to do with outsource billing services, and also they sell the debt to debt collectors.

So I'd love to work with any stakeholders of the Commission on this process. I've talked to my colleagues, and they all agree it's an incredibly growing problem, and I just feel bad for these injured workers because they get the statements. They get sent to collections, and then we try to help them, and it's just -- it's very, very difficult.

Thank you for your time.

CHAIRMAN KAVANAUGH: Thank you, Susan.
